This year's event coincided with the 600th Anniversary of the Battle of Zalgiris, Grunwald, Tannenburg (same battle, 3 national names). The Lithuanian Post 154 Color Guard carried American and Lithuanian flags during the observance ceremonies. And I was given the privilege of placing a wreath (which displayed a banner inscribed "American Legion Lithuanian Post 154, Baltimore, Maryland") at the Kosciuszko Monument. This was the first time Lithuanians had been accorded the honor of playing an active part in the observance.

Also, this was not the only activity of distinction for the Post. Once again we reached Three-Star status in membership and have elected a full slate of Officers for the coming year. We can achieve goals like these because members like you payour dues on time, and are willing to become Post Officers and pitch in and help out. Thanks, again. It is good to be a member of an active and proud American Legion Post.

Several Post members attended the Baltimore District Memorial Day Service at the National Cemetery in Catonsville, MD. Vincent Dulys and I took part in the POW/MIA service. After the Memorial Service, we visited the grave of William Lacs who served as Lithuanian Post 154 Commander, 1958-1959.

Lithuanian Post 154 participated in the 2010 Lithuanian Festival. Thanks to Fred Kaminski and Toivo Tagaments for setting up and manning our information table. Our Lithuanian Post 154 Historian, Henry Gaidis, had some of his collection of old armaments and military medals on display.

Children were given toys, flag pins, pencils, pens, patriotic pictures and coloring books. Adults picked up brochures about The American Legion and the Lithuanian Post 154 History flier written by Henry Gaidis several years ago. Several visitors expressed interest in joining Lithuanian Post 154. They took applications and promised to return them with copies of their DD214 military discharge form.

The cross, located in the Mojave National Preserve, had been covered by a wooden box during a 10-year legal battle. At stake was whether erecting a religious symbol on Government-owned land violated the First Amendment of the US Constitution. (The cross was torn down two weeks after the court decision by vandals. However, it has been replaced and is still standing).

What next? The insidious attempt to remove our longstanding values goes on. So it behooves us to bear in mind the American Legion motto, "FOR GOD AND COUNTRY SINCE 1919" printed on the front cover of "Legion" magazine, just above your address label. It is through example and active participation in traditional activities that we remain strong in our efforts to see that these values remain in force in our democratic Republic.

So in spite of all the disasters and uncertain economic times, be thankful for all that we have and enjoy the hazy, lazy days of summer.

Lithuanian Cadets Receive Scholarships at US Military Service Academies

Three cadets of the Lithuanian Military Academy were granted scholarships at US Military Academies. Third year cadet Vytautas Drejeris will study at the United States Naval Academy in Annapolis, MD, second year cadet Saulius Gauronskis will study at the United States Military Academy at West Point, NY and second year cadet Giedrius Mikalauskas will study at the United States Coast Guard Academy in New London, CT. Lithuanian cadets are among the 32 international students who have been selected for scholarships in the prestigious US military education institutions.



After studies in the United States, the cadets will begin their service in the Lithuanian Armed Forces.

This is the twelfth time Lithuanian cadets have been selected to study at the US Military Service Academies. During the past sixteen years, over twenty cadets from Lithuania have participated in the program.

US Military Academy Invitation

The American Association of the Friends of Kosciuszko at West Point invited Lithuanian Post 154 to participate in their 7th annual conference commemorating General Thaddeus Kosciuszko at the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, New York. Although traditionally a Polish-American event, this year representatives of the Lithuanian-American community were invited to take part in the two-day ceremonies starting April 30, 2010.

The year 2010 is also the 600th Anniversary of the famous Polish-Lithuanian victory over the Order of Teutonic Knights at the Battle of Zalgiris. The honored attendees included Audrius Bruzga, the Ambassador of the Republic of Lithuania, Wlodzimierz Sulgostowski, the First Counselor of the Polish Embassy and leaders of many Lithuanian and Polish groups from America including Lithuanian Post 154. The American Legion Lithuanian Post 154 Color Guard was led by Commander John F. Maskavich and included Vincent T. Dulys, Gintaras Bulivys, and Henry L. Gaidis.

The two-day event focused on the contributions made by Kosciuszko to America, Poland and Lithuania and the significance of the Battle of Zalgiris. After Sunday Mass at the Catholic Chapel of the Holy Trinity on the grounds of West Point, the Color Guards of Lithuanian Post 154 and the Polish Sea League of New York led a parade to the famous Plains of West Point. Here, attendees watched a Cadet Drill Team and Parachute presentations, followed by a full dress Cadet Review Ceremony. The Legionnaires then marched to the nearby Kosciuszko Monument overlooking the beautiful Hudson River valley. Following the Posting of Colors at the Monument, the American, Lithuanian and Polish national anthems were sung. Wreaths were placed at the Monument, and a US Army Honor Guard fired volleys in honor of the General. Taps were then sounded by a US Military Academy bugler. The ceremonies concluded with attendees singing *Marsz, Marsz Polonia, Kur Lugus Laukai*, and *God Bless America*, followed by the retiring of the Color Guards from the area.

General Thaddeus Kosciuszko

Andrew Thaddeus Bonaventure Kosciuszko was born on February 12, 1746, in the Polish-Lithuanian Commonwealth. Thaddeus studied at the Polish-Lithuanian Military Academy in Warsaw from 1765-1769. He subsequently spent several years studying engineering, painting, military and political science in France, Germany and Italy.

Kosciuszko became enthusiastic about the cause of American freedom and offered his services in their struggle for independence. In 1776, Kosciuszko sailed for America. On October 30, 1776 the Continental Congress granted Kosciuszko a brevet commission as Colonel of Engineers. Kosciuszko's engineering skills proved invaluable to the American war effort. The fortifications he built at Bemis Heights proved crucial in winning the Battle of Saratoga. This battle is considered to have been the turning point in the War of Independence and directly led to France joining in the conflict. General Washington considered West Point, the plateau overlooking the Hudson River, an important strategic position and in 1778 sent Kosciuszko to that location to design fortifications to defend it. On this plateau Kosciuszko built a series of forts that prevented the British from taking control of the river and dividing New York from New England. Had the British been able to seize control of the river, they would have been able to freely obtain reinforcements and supplies from Canada. It was on this same plateau at West Point that the United States established its military academy in 1802 which today is the oldest continuously garrisoned military post in the country.

For his service, Kosciuszko was belatedly promoted to the rank of Brigadier General. He returned to Poland to continue his struggle of expanding freedom to his homeland. Although Kosciuszko won great honor and glory leading Poles and Lithuanians against the Russians who threatened the Polish-Lithuanian Commonwealth during the so-called Kosciuszko Insurrection of 1794, he was unable to overcome the insurmountable odds. Kosciuszko died in exile on October 15, 1817, in Solothurn, Switzerland while still dreaming of the liberation of his homeland.

Battle of Zalgiris

The Battle of Zalgiris (Lithuanian), also called the Battle of Grunwald in Poland and Battle of Tannenburg in Germany, was fought on July 15, 1410 between the Polish-Lithuanian forces under the command of Polish King Jogaila and his cousin Lithuanian Grand Duke Vytautas-the-Great against the Prussian military and religious Order of Teutonic Knights under the command of its Grand Master Ulrich von Jungingen which sought to occupy the entire Baltic Sea area. Most historians consider the bloody Battle of Zalgiris to have been one of the ten most historically important European battles. In this battle, the combined Polish and Lithuanian forces so decisively defeated the Order of Teutonic Knights that they soon ceased to exist and their demise curtailed the German expansion into Eastern Europe for the next 500 years.
